Pharmacy Residency Purpose Statement

PGY1 pharmacy residency programs build on Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) education and outcomes to develop competent, experienced, acute care clinical pharmacists who are eligible for board certification and postgraduate year two (PGY2) pharmacy residency training.

PGY1 Resident Qualifications

- Residents must be a graduate of an ACPE accredited Doctor of Pharmacy degree program
- Residents must be licensed or be eligible for pharmacist licensure in IL. Residents are expected to take the licensure board exams (NAPLEX and MPJE) prior to residency start date.
- Residents shall participate in and obey the rules of the Residency Matching Program.

- A Letter of Intent including a statement of professional goals and reasons for pursuing a PGY1
- Three Letter of Recommendation Forms
- Official transcript from an accredited School / College of Pharmacy
